General Assistance Update

RSA 165:1 Who is Entitled: Local Responsibility

Whenever a person in any town is poor and unable to support himself, he shall be relieved and maintained by the overseer of public welfare of such town, whether or not he has residence there. For the purpose of this chapter the term "residence" shall have the same definition as in RSA 21:6a

During Covid-19 local welfare saw a dramatic decrease in persons applying for assistance due to several factors. A moratorium had been placed on evictions and electric and gas disconnects, and food stamp allotments were temporarily increased. For persons whose employment was impacted by the pandemic, which was pretty much everyone, the federal government funded the **Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP)** implemented by the Community Action Program whereby eligible individuals and families could receive up to eighteen months of rental and utilities assistance. For those individuals and families who were homeless, this program paid for their motel stays for those eighteen months and beyond. That program officially ended in October 2022, however, applications that had already been submitted were still being processed beyond that date. With those funds in place, landlords and tenants were relying on that assistance to pay for their rent and utilities thus alleviating the need to apply for welfare assistance.

The intent of the program was good, unfortunately, it set up some families for failure as it placed them in housing which was more than they could afford once they returned to employment status. Other families found themselves faced with eviction notices due to landlords wishing to make "renovations" and thus increase rents, at times nearly doubling the rent. As affordable housing became nearly impossible to find for families many found themselves homeless. With federal funds no longer available and no where else to turn, the number of welfare applicants has skyrocketed since May. And, per RSA 165, it is local welfare's responsibility to assist these families and individuals with a safe living environment, which can include a shelter referral if a shelter is available. However, due to the increase in homelessness, our shelters are always full. Homeless applicants are now placed on a waiting list or told to call daily to see if there is available space. With no shelter space available, Welfare is forced to place

eligible clients in motels. Yet, many motels are now refusing to accept welfare vouchers due to the fact that many suffered significant damage and loss when they housed so many homeless persons and families during Covid-19. I spent three hours on the phone trying to secure a motel room for an elderly couple last week calling all the way from Salem to Tilton. They were either full or would not accept a welfare voucher. As winter sets in, this situation will only get worse.

I have been spending countless hours dealing with landlords who have allowed their tenants to fall as much as six months in arrears before issuing them an Eviction Notice. Those Eviction Notices can amount to many thousands of dollars. (One family with five children owed more than \$6,000 in rental arrearages.) If evicted these people have no where to go and it would be the Town's responsibility to put them up in a motel until they can secure safe, affordable housing, which would take many months. The deals I make with landlords and applicants does put some responsibility back on the tenants and landlords. Believe me, I do hold people accountable. I emphatically stress to landlords the importance of issuing Eviction Notices immediately when tenants fall even one month behind. They do no one favors by letting them slide on their rent payment. That education process also is time consuming as I sometimes have to explain to landlords how the entire welfare process works, both state and local.

An attorney from NH Legal Assistance addressed our Local Welfare
Association meeting on September 21st and outlined in no uncertain terms the
responsibilities of local welfare. Several cities and towns are not adhering to
RSA165 and it is impacting all of us as local welfare is now being monitored closely
for violations. It became necessary in March of this year for the legislature to pass
SB110 regarding residency. New Hampshire Local Welfare Administrators have
always had an Ethics Policy prohibiting "dumping" clients in another town. This
policy was not law...now it is. So, if someone walks through our front door looking
for welfare assistance, no matter where they are from, we are obligated by law to
assist. Other agencies who are also overwhelmed with the number of applicants
are quick to tell people to go to your local welfare office, "they have to give you an
application". Which, by law, they are right. However, the tone sets people up and
several applicants have come in with hostile, negative attitudes which is neither
fair to them nor the person at our front desk.

We were also told by Legal Assistance that the <u>first time</u> someone applies for local welfare we cannot hold them accountable for any money they had and have already spent. We have to render assistance based on the money they have at the time of application. We can, however, require them to use any future income to be applied to their basic living expenses, i.e., rent, electric, heat and food.

The prices of rents continue to increase and, although, we still have some affordable housing in Pembroke, more and more landlords are selling to out of state companies who are increasing their rents and forcing the working class tenants out. If an applicant can verify that they will be able to afford their rent going forward, I will assist with first month's or current month's rent, even if it is over our welfare allowable expense, in order to keep them housed.

Along those lines I have increased our Allowable Expenses Guidelines to reflect the current market values here in Pembroke. Yet, I know, in some cases, rents will exceed even these guidelines.

Heat and utilities are determined by the average rates for similar rental units and are subject to constant change. Only current actual usage is calculated as an allowable expense. Heating costs will not be an allowable expense from May 1st thru October 31st.

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ARTICLE 4- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$730,402 to purchase a new EV refuse truck with accessories and to further authorize the transfer of a sum not to exceed \$100,000 from the Town Equipment Capital Reserve Fund to cover the Towns cost of 5%. The Town of Pembroke has applied for a grant through the State of NH DES which will provide approximately 95% reimbursement of the total cost. These funds are being made available as part of grant that was obtained by the State from the Volkswagen Environmental Mitigation Trust Fund/Granite State Clean Fleets. This warrant article is contingent upon receiving the funding from the State.

ARTICLE 5 – To see if the Town will vote to establish a Pembroke EMS Ambulance Fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h I (b) to continue providing ambulance services for the Town of Pembroke. The money received from fees and charges for EMS/Ambulance services, shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year and shall not be part of the Town's General Fund unreserved fund balances. All expenditures related to this fund shall be for payroll and operational expenses associated with continuing to provide an ambulance service to the community. The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund, and shall pay out the same only upon the order of the Board of Selectmen, and no further approval is required by the legislative body to expend. Such funds may be expended only for the purpose for which the fund was created. This fund will replace the Tri Town EMS Intermunicipal fund that was created in March 17, 2012 which will be dissolved due to the Town of Allenstown cancelling the intermunicipal agreement/contract for joint ambulance services with Pembroke which is effective July 1, 2024. Any funds remaining in the previously established fund from 2012 will not be transferred to either Town until the dissolution is complete and the financial records have been audited by a certified public accounting firm.

ARTICLE 6 – Shall the town Vote to Modify Chapter 138, Article IV of the Pembroke Town Code, entitled Elderly Exemptions under the provisions of RSA 72:39-a for elderly exemption from property tax in Pembroke, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 74 years, \$47,250; for a person 75 years of age up to 79 years, \$87,750; for a person 80 years of age or older \$168,750. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least the last 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least the last 5 consecutive years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$28,407 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$40,667; and own net assets not in excess of \$45,000 excluding the value of the person's residence.

Re: Letter of credit for Phase II Roadway and Site Restoration, San Ken Homes

Subdivision

The office received the attached letter of credit for completion of the roadway and site restoration for Phase II (remainder of Blane Circle).

The town requires a road bond in place to ensure that the roads are completed to Town spec and in accordance with the approved plan. The town requires a site bond in place to ensure that any disturbed ground is stabilized in the event the project is abandoned.

The site estimate was prepared by the Town Engineer on July 12, 2023 and approved by the Planning Board on July 25, 2023. The road estimate was prepared by the Town Engineer on August 18, 2023 and approved by the Planning Board on September 12, 2023. Once the applicant secures a letter of credit in the approved amount, the Board of Selectmen vote to accept the bond, thereby holding the money until the completion of the work.

The letter of credit was received on November 16, 2023. Work is anticipated to begin on Phase II this spring.

Staff recommends that the Board of Selectmen accept the letter of credit in the amount of \$581,913 as prepared by the Town Engineer and approved by the Planning Board.

Total length of roadway included in Phase I is 2,550 and as shown on the approved Subdivision Plan dated 9/22/2020 and recorded at the Merrimack County Registry of Deeds as Plan #202100004746, or as described in the minutes of meetings or other documents comprising the file of the 9/22/20 meeting of the Pembroke Planning Board related to this matter."

Any funds not needed by the Town of Pembroke to complete the required improvements shall be returned to

BankProv f/k/a The Provident Bank. This Irrevocable Letter of Credit #2023-102 shall expire on November 1, 2024.

It is agreed and understood by the issuer of this Letter of Credit that it shall be issued for a period of no more than twelve (12) months. If all improvements guaranteed by this Letter of Credit are not completed by November 1, 2024, and if a certificate indicating completion of all improvements has not been issued by the Director of Public Works for the Town of Pembroke then this Letter of Credit shall be automatically considered to have been called. Without further action of the Town of Pembroke or its Planning Board, the amount of \$581,913.00, less any amounts then previously partially released, shall forthwith be forwarded, in the form of a check, to the Treasurer of the Town of Pembroke. The funds so forwarded by BankProv f/k/a The Provident Bank to the town Treasurer shall be used exclusively for the purpose of completing the improvements which are guaranteed by this Letter of Credit. Any funds not needed by the Town to complete improvements required by the subdivision plan referred to above shall be returned to The Provident Bank.

This Letter of Credit is neither assignable nor transferable without the written consent of the Issuer.

Except as otherwise expressly stated herein, this Letter of Credit is subject to the "Uniform Customs and Practice for Documentary Credits (1993 Revision) International Chamber of Commerce Publication No. 500" and is also subject to "Article 5 of the Uniform Commercial Code, RSA 382-A:5." In the event of any conflict between said Publication No. 500 and said Article 5, Article 5 shall control.

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

ARTICLE 2 – AMEND ZONING ORDINANCE

Amendment #1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Pembroke Zoning Ordinance as follows: amend Article VIII, Signs to remove content-based regulations in accordance with the 2014 Supreme Court ruling on content-neutrality as it relates to the first amendment, reformat the Ordinance to be user-friendly, and amend 143-28.G. Minor Home Business, §143-29.G. Major Home Business, §143-30.1.D.(5) Office Conversion, and §143-42.F. Commercial Kennels as they relate to signs and content-neutrality. No substantive changes are proposed to the regulations?

The purpose of Amendment #1 is to comply with a 2014 Supreme Court ruling on first amendment rights relative to the Zoning Ordinance and to improve the formatting of the Sign Ordinance. No substantive changes are included in this amendment.

Amendment #2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Pembroke Zoning Ordinance to amend Article VIII, Signs to allow off-premise signs in the B1, B2, and LO Districts by special exception of the Zoning Board?

The purpose of Amendment #2 is to allow off-premises signs in the B1, B2, and LO Districts

by special exception where they are currently prohibited.

Amendment #3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Pembroke Zoning Ordinance to amend Article VIII, Signs to allow signs to cover window sills and architectural molding?

The purpose of Amendment #3 is to allow signs to cover window sills and architectural molding, which is currently prohibited.

Amendment #4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Pembroke Zoning Ordinance as follows: amend §143-8, Definitions and §143-69, Floodplain Development District as necessary to comply with requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program?

The purpose of Amendment #4 is to adopt FEMA-mandated amendments to remain in compliance with the National Flood Insurance Program.

Amendment #5

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #5, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Pembroke Zoning Ordinance to amend the provisions regarding Manufactured Housing Parks by inserting proper references to the Table of Dimensional and Density Standards, which was updated last year?

The purpose of Amendment #5 is a clean-up item to update a reference to the Table of Dimensional and Density Standards, which was reformatted last year.

Amendment #6

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #6, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Pembroke Zoning Ordinance to remove from the purposes of the Wetlands Protection District the purpose of "encouraging uses that can be appropriately and safely located in wetland areas"?

The purpose of Amendment #6 is to clarify that uses in the wetlands are not encouraged, as identified in the 2020 Pembroke Master Plan.

MARCH 16, 2024 - SECOND SESSION OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING (Deliberative)

ARTICLE 3 - To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$152,000 (gross budget) to defray the cost for the purpose of performing a stormwater infrastructure project for Memorial Park drainage improvements phase 2 and associated MS 4 requirements, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$152,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33); and, further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; and, to further authorize the Board of Selectmen to offset a portion of said appropriation by applying for and expending Clean Water State Revolving Funds (CWSRF) loan funds. Repayment of the loan funds will include up to 100% forgiveness of loan principal in an amount up to \$110,400. (3/5 ballot vote required)

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen 5-0 Recommended by the Budget Committee 10-0 ARTICLE 4- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$730,402 to purchase a new EV refuse truck with accessories and to further authorize the transfer of a sum not to exceed \$100,000 from the Town Equipment Capital Reserve Fund to cover the Towns cost of 5%. The Town of Pembroke has applied for a grant through the State of NH DES which will provide approximately 95% reimbursement of the total cost. These funds are being made available as part of grant that was obtained by the State from the Volkswagen Environmental Mitigation Trust Fund/Granite State Clean Fleets. This warrant article is contingent upon receiving the funding from the State.

ARTICLE 5 – To see if the Town will vote to establish a Pembroke EMS Ambulance Fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h I (b) to continue providing ambulance services for the Town of Pembroke. The money received from fees and charges for EMS/Ambulance services, shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year and shall not be part of the Town's General Fund unreserved fund balances. All expenditures related to this fund shall be for payroll and operational expenses associated with continuing to provide an ambulance service to the community. The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund, and shall pay out the same only upon the order of the Board of Selectmen, and no further approval is required by the legislative body to expend. Such funds may be expended only for the purpose for which the fund was created. This fund will replace the Tri Town EMS Intermunicipal fund that was created in March 17, 2012 which will be dissolved due to the Town of Allenstown cancelling the intermunicipal agreement/contract for joint ambulance services with Pembroke which is effective July 1, 2024. Any funds remaining in the previously established fund from 2012 will not be transferred to either Town until the dissolution is complete and the financial records have been audited by a certified public accounting firm.

ARTICLE 6 – Shall the town Vote to Modify Chapter 138, Article IV of the Pembroke Town Code, entitled Elderly Exemptions under the provisions of RSA 72:39-a for elderly exemption from property tax in Pembroke, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 74 years, \$47,250; for a person 75 years of age up to 79 years, \$87,750; for a person 80 years of age or older \$168,750. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least the last 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least the last 5 consecutive years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$28,407 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$40,667; and own net assets not in excess of \$45,000 excluding the value of the person's residence.

III. Scheduled Meetings

Public Hearing - Proposed Memorial Park Bond through State of NH DES

Selectman Goulet opened the public hearing at 6:30.

Selectman Goulet explained the grant is for \$152,000 with principal forgiveness of \$110,400. This will be a ballot vote requiring 3/5 majority to pass but a public hearing must be held prior to March Town Meeting.

Gerry Fleury, 21 Kimball Street, is in favor of the warrant article as Memorial Park is a valuable asset to the Town of Pembroke.

Selectman Frederickson is also in favor of this warrant article to protect against erosion at Memorial Park.

Selectman Goulet closed the public hearing at 6:32

V. New Business

VJ Ranfos Public Works Director

There is a 6-unit townhouse complex being constructed at 11 Kimball Street. At a preconstruction meeting with the previous owners, they were made aware of some drainage on the property. They survey maps didn't show any but people who had knowledge of the area confirmed it was there. When the digging for the foundation began, they found a 10-inch clay drainage culvert that runs down the middle of where the foundation will be. The owners went to the Roads Committee for suggestions and Roads suggested cameraing the pipe to see if there is anything connected and then make a plan to move/repair/replace it. Selectman Frederickson asked why it would be the Town's responsibility to move it. Paul Valley, excavation contractor for the property, answered there is no easement for it to be on the property. Selectman Gagyi asked if this is similar to the pipe at the old village school. VJ answered it is similar. They need authorization from the Selectmen to move forward with cameraing the lines. There is a quote from Eastern Pipe Services for a full day at \$1,850 or a half day for \$1,250. They do not know how long it will take since they are unsure what is down there.

Selectman Goulet made a motion to authorize VJ Ranfos, Public Works Director, to hire Eastern Pipe Service for the day. Selectman Gagyi seconded the motion. Motion passed 4-0.

Solid Waste Discussion Re: Electric Trash Truck

Gerry Fleury, Chair of Solid Waste Advisory, shared the Committee met January 30, 2024 to discuss the new electric trash truck in Warrant Article 4. The Committee has concerns the grant will \$684,970 but the cost of the truck is higher. There has to be amendments to the warrant article to identify the source of the additional funding. There has also been concern over the timeframe of the project since the vehicle has to be purchased before the Town can apply for reimbursement. The current cost of the truck is \$765,768. \$80,998 will need to come from the Equipment Capital Reserve to make up the difference. This could delay other items currently in the CIP for that capital reserve. The warrant article needs to allow for extra funds to come from the capital reserve in case the truck costs rise a little more.

Pennti Aalto, Bachelder Road, if we do not do this, we will be buying another truck in the near future which will cost around a half million and be diesel.

Selectman Goulet made a motion to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$730,402 to purchase a new EV refuge truck and accessories and to further authorize the transfer of a sum not to exceed \$100,000 from the Town Equipment Capital Reserve Fund to cover the Town's cost of 5%. The Town of Pembroke has applied for a grant from the State of NH DES which will provide approximately 95% of the total cost. These funds are being made available by the grant that was obtained by the State from the Volkswagen Environmental mitigation trust fund/Granite State Clean Fleets. This warrant article is contingent upon receiving funding from the state. Selectman Frederickson seconded the motion. Motion passed 4-0.

Application for payment Trustees of Trust Funds

Selectman Goulet made a motion to approve the application for payment from the Trustee of Trust Funds in the amount of \$30,462.27 and to use the funds from the Town Building Capital Reserve Fund. Selectman Frederickson seconded the motion. Motion passed 4-0.

Manifest/Abatements

Selectman Goulet made a motion to accept the manifest and abatements as presented. Selectman Frederickson seconded the motion. Motion passed 4-0.

Minutes 1/17/24







REVALUATION OF PEMBROKE 2024

Full re-appraisals of all taxable and exempt properties are required at least once every five years by the State of New Hampshire's Department of Revenue Administration (NH DRA)

Pembroke's last full revaluation of all property took place in 2019

Currently, the assessments in town are at 64.9% of market value. This means that assessments are 35.1% below market value

Example, a house in Pembroke that is currently assessed at \$324,500 but sells in the open market for \$500,000. \$324,500 / \$500,000 = .649

During a revaluation year, the NH DRA and the NH Assessing Standards Board (ASB) requires that a municipality's assessments be between 90% and 110% of market value






